## Notes from the Vestry

Your vestry met last week, and I'm pleased to report to you that our finances continue to be favorable; we are comfortably "in the black" for fiscal 2021, and we eagerly anticipate the final pledge totals so we can finalize the 2022 budget. We are so grateful for your support of Trinity Folsom; your sharing of your time, talents, and let's face it - your pledges - have helped Trinity Folsom to serve this community, not just on Sundays but on all days, during a time when so many have needed a way to connect.

In our meeting we heard from Jr. Warden Judy Pinney, who has worked tirelessly to keep our refreshed campus beautiful; we also heard reports from Trinity Thrift Shop, which reawakened after the pandemic with a roar. We also heard a report from the Finance Committee, which recently reviewed Trinity's budget and capital financing, and has recommended the formation of a compensation committee to ensure that we do what we can to carefully and properly compensate Fr. Todd and the Trinity team.

We're on the cusp of the frenzy of Advent, and things are likely to get pretty hectic around here. I pray you and your families are safe and healthy this holiday season, and you will continue to keep your Trinity family safe and healthy as well: wear a mask, respect folks' personal space, and if you're under the weather, consider participating in Sunday services online. I dislike wearing a mask as much as the next person (I don't like it when my glasses fog up!), but I know there are many in our parish family for whom coming to church on Sunday is their single calculated risk of the week - those battling cancer, the not-yet-vaccinated, and others otherwise immunocompromised - and they depend on us and trust us to help keep them safe. ## Flu Shots & Covid Boosters

I've found David Leonhardt's "The Morning" newsletter from the New York Times to be a very calm, reasonable voice to guide me in understanding the pandemic. On Monday, Leonhardt reminded us that the vaccines are "remarkably effective at turning Covid into a manageable illness that's less dangerous than some everyday activities," at least for people under 65 with no underlying conditions. But, he counseled, people over the age of 65, and particularly people over 80, and folks of any age with "specific vulnerabilities" (like immune disorders and transplant recipients) need to take special precautions. He wrote that "the most effective way to protect vulnerable people is through vaccination – not only of them but also of others who might infect them." The example he gave was children, for whom "Covid remains overwhelmingly mild," can infect adults for whom it can be severe and even fatal, and an unvaccinated child is more likely than a vaccinated child to infect others. He made a similar argument for booster shots for all adults, about which he previously has been a self-described skeptic. Younger adults "remain highly protected from severe illness" despite receiving two shots months ago, but their mild case can infect an older and more vulnerable adult who might become severely ill.

I encourage you, especially if you are older or medically vulnerable, to consider getting your Covid vaccine booster, and if you can, a flu shot, too. Several staff members have already gotten theirs, and others are scheduling theirs, and from our experiences, we recommend you make an appointment instead of showing up for your shot as a walk-in. If you aren't sure about what you need or what to expect or have any questions, talk to your doctor. If you don't have a doctor, e-mail me and I will help you answer your questions and connect you to a medical professional. If you need help finding a place to get a shot or navigating the technology to sign up, talk to me or to any of the parish staff and we'll be happy to help you. ~ Fr. Todd+

## Organ Fund

Our organ is very old and its maintenance (repair and replacement) needs are increasing rapidly, to the point of it not making much sense for us to pour so much money into it when we really

need to buy a new one. We haven't started shopping yet, but we know from other churches' recent purchases that we're probably looking at \$150,000, give or take. Our organ isn't dead yet, but we are beginning to plan to replace it. As part of that planning, we've created a savings fund so that we'll have the money to replace it in the very near future. The vestry has designated the loose plate offering (donations that aren't part of pledges) on Christmas Eve to go to the Organ Fund, and if you find yourself with a little extra as you consider your end-of-year charitable giving, the Organ Fund is already open and receiving gifts.
