New Book for Trinity Wednesdays!

Bowler, a professor at the divinity school at Duke University, was thirty-five and a new mother when she was diagnosed with Stage IV colon cancer. In this book she confronts her mortality and the loss of certainty, provoking questions we should all be asking ourselves. Music Notes ~ Anglican Star Worship

This week's opening hymn is #118 "Brightest and best of the stars of the morning" written by Father Reginald Heber (1783-1826). Fr. Heber wrote texts to raise the level of congregational singing in his parish in England. He didn't have very many positive things to say about the poetry written for congregational use during his day; instead, Heber saw modern hymns as "ditties of embraces and passion, or language which it would be disgraceful in an earthly sovereign to endure." While his poetry would be crafted with greater eloquence—as he saw it—accusers question if "Brightest and best" promotes star worship. Yes, you read that correctly! It doesn't help Heber's case that he includes a line about "sons of the morning," possibly referring to Lucifer. In fact, in the 1982 hymnal, these words have been changed to "stars of the morning" to avoid the issue altogether. Great care has been taken with this text to ensure that there's not a line that could be construed as fostering star worship! ~ Dr. Brett Judson, Director of Music

Meet Your Vestry ~ Charlie Biegel



Charlie Biegel was born and raised in western Massachusetts, where his family was active at Grace Episcopal Church in Dalton. As an undergraduate computer science major at Siena College in upstate New York, Charlie was taking a break from church-going until a guy on his cross-country team asked why he never saw him in church, so Charlie started going again with him. Charlie went on to earn a graduate degree in software engineering from George Mason University, and spent ten years at AOL in the Washington DC area before moving to Folsom in 2012 to be the chief operating officer of Eyefinity, one of the VSP Global businesses headquartered in Rancho Cordova. Charlie married Sharon in 1991, and they have two boys, Cameron and Logan. Sharon serves as one of our counters, sorting, recording, and depositing the weekly offering. Cameron is a junior at Humboldt State majoring in zoology. Logan, a sophomore at Folsom High, serves as an acolyte like Charlie did when he was a boy, and is involved in our youth group.

At his previous parish, St. Matthew's Sterling in northern Virginia, Charlie served on vestry; as senior warden, treasurer, and as a counter; taught Sunday School and worked with the youth group; and served on a mission trip to Haiti to rebuild homes after the devastating earthquake in 2010. Here at Trinity Folsom, Charlie attends the 9am service; has served on the vestry, the finance committee, the master site planning committee, and the capital campaign committee; and he is the faithful teacher for the middle school Sunday School class, bless him.

When Charlie moved to the Sacramento area, he began searching for a church on his own while Sharon and the boys finished out the school year in northern Virginia. Thinking that they would end up living somewhere near his work, he started by looking at all the Episcopal churches nearby. One Sunday, he visited our neighbors over at St. Francis' Fair Oaks, and was really surprised at how different California Episcopalians were from Virginia ones, until he realized he was actually attending the Korean Presbyterian service hosted by St. Francis! He eventually visited Trinity Folsom, and when he filled out a visitor's card, Father Todd realized that he and Charlie were literally neighbors, living as recent arrivals to town in the same apartment complex.

Charlie is excited to be back in church, and, even though he was instrumental in the expansion of our building, he is even more excited about the expansion of our programs, outreach, and staffing over the past few years and hopes to see that expansion continue. He loves to see us taking on more, like hosting in our Parish Hall the check-in for the Folsom homeless shelter: he appreciates that "we're not just growing larger in attendance, we're also doing more." As the father of two boys, and as a dedicated Sunday School teacher, Charlie appreciates how we involve youth in the ministry of the Church, including them fully as lectors, ushers, and acolytes serving as equals with adults. Charlie wants us to continue to grow our presence in the community and that our youth programs will grow and thrive. He's also pleased that in recent years we have had an impact on the wider church in terms of clergy, sending Fr. Charlie to be a rector in Montana, and now preparing to send Anna Wiley to seminary to be formed for priesthood. Charlie's hope for Trinity Folsom is that we "continue to be an open and inclusive parish, a place where everyone feels welcome, and everyone has an opportunity to learn and grow and develop meaningful relationships with God and other people."

Meet Your Vestry ~ Christy Evans



Christy (Peirce) Evans was born in Oakland and grew up in the Bay Area, Davis, and finally Placerville, where her mother was the (Presbyterian!) pastor of Federated Church for over twenty years. After college at UC-Santa Barbara, Christy returned to Sacramento, where she met John Evans over a pint of Pabst Blue Ribbon at the Pine Cove Tavern on 29th Street. John and Christy married in 1999. Christy is the director of talent

acquisition for an international digital advertising agency; John is the chief operating officer of the same agency. The Evanses live in Serrano with their three kids: Will, a student at Chico State and a medic in the Army Reserves; Colin, a biology major at Folsom Lake; and Elly, an eighth-grader. Elly and Christy are active in the National Charity League, a mother-daughter volunteer organization. Christy delivers meals for El Dorado County Senior Services, volunteers for the El Dorado Hills Community Services District, and serves on the board of the Sugarloaf Station Foundation, a fine arts camp based in El Dorado County.

When Christy moved to El Dorado Hills, she knew she could drive up to Placerville to attend the church in which she grew up, but her mother was still the pastor there and she wanted to forge her own path somewhere new. She tried many local churches, but none of them combined the traditional worship and inclusive community she loves. She heard about The Episcopal Church and in 2006, the Evanses began attending the parish in Cameron Park. She appreciated that she was immediately and enthusiastically welcomed there, and she became involved in children's ministries, a book club, and a women's Bible study there.

Her first visit to Trinity Folsom was in 2018 on Labor Day weekend, when the Abello family hosts their annual pool party for the children of the parish and their families. Tovi met her at church that morning and invited her to bring Elly to the pool party; she said it was her first day here and they weren't parishioners, but Tovi said that they were most welcome, so they went and really connected with the people they met there. Christy quickly became involved here at Trinity Folsom. She serves as a lector and an usher and is a regular at Trinity Wednesdays; she has also taught Sunday School and helped with Vacation Bible School, and before the pandemic was a consistent volunteer at parish fellowship events like the Harvest Festival. Elly was in the Children's Choir and now is an acolyte and active in our youth group. You'll find Christy, John, and Elly at the 9am service.

Christy worked in youth ministry when she was in college and believes strongly in the necessity for youth ministry, so she is excited to see us expanding our youth programming and continuing to work on developing a youth group. She appreciates that this parish has a serious commitment to serving our neighbors and hopes that we will continue to expand our outreach programs and create new opportunities to reach more people and meet their needs. She's hopeful that our congregation will continue to become more diverse, fully reflecting the demographics of the communities we serve, and be a welcoming place for all people, whatever their race, socioeconomic status, sexual orientation, or what their family looks like. And she's hopeful that we will keep growing in numbers, too; "we've done an amazing thing with our campus, and now this parish is positioned to be transformed to the next level."
