Music Notes ~ Where is Middle C on the Organ?

This week we focus on the pitch level of stops. Many of you have taken piano lessons, so you might be familiar with where “middle C” is on the piano. The organ also has middle C, but it can also “move” middle C to a different place on the keyboard because of stop knobs that correspond to different pitch levels. The lowest note of a stop is designated by its low C in the rank. An 8-foot pipe is a low C, corresponding exactly to the sounds that are played on the piano. But if an organist draws a 4-foot stop, half the length, middle C is moved down an octave on the keyboard. This can allow the organist to combine middle C and the C an octave higher at the same time, allowing for multiple pipes at different pitch levels to sound at the same time. This is especially useful when trying to reinforce certain frequencies to create a certain color or increase volume to help lead congregational singing. If you’re with me so far, you’ll be even more surprised to learn that there are stops on the organ that allow the organist to play a key on the keyboard and hear the note of another. For example, an organist might draw a stop marked $2 \frac{2}{3}$, play middle C and hear a G, a note that is an octave plus a perfect fifth higher! Similarly, a $1 \frac{3}{5}$ stop would allow the organist to play a C and hear E, a note two octaves plus a pure third above. By understanding the different pitch level of stops, an organist can create a variety of combinations of tone and color.
