Music Notes ~ The Crescendo of the Swell Organ

This week we focus on the divisions of the pipe organ. The three different manuals and pedal board of Trinity's organ control unique divisions of the organ. Each division of a pipe organ is complete, having its own windchest, key action, and ranks of pipes. Each division has a name of its own, such as the "Great Organ," "Swell Organ," "Choir Organ," and "Pedal Organ." The names of the different divisions of the organ owe their debt to their location in a church, in relation to where the organist sat. The division's name could also be given for its unique characteristics, such as the swell organ. The swell organ is a giant wooden box, which houses pipes with wooden shades. These shades could be opened and closed by the organist's foot to give the effect of that division getting louder or softer.

Word of the Week

Our word of the week is Pentecost/Whitsunday. The word Pentecost itself means “the fiftieth day.” It is used in both the Old and New Testaments. In the OT it refers to a feast of seven weeks known as the Feast of Weeks. It was apparently an agricultural event that focused on the harvesting of first fruits. Josephus referred to Pentecost as the fiftieth day after the first day of Passover. The term is used in the New Testament to refer to the coming of the Spirit on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1), shortly after Jesus’ death, resurrection, and ascension. Christians came to understand the meaning of Pentecost in terms of the gift of the Spirit. The Pentecost event was the fulfillment of a promise which Jesus gave concerning the return of the Holy Spirit. The speaking in tongues, which was a major effect of having received the Spirit, is interpreted by some to symbolize the church’s worldwide preaching. In the Christian tradition, Pentecost is now the seventh Sunday after Easter. It emphasizes that the church is understood as the body of Christ which is drawn together and given life by the Holy Spirit. Some understand Pentecost to be the origin and sending out of the church into the world. The Day of Pentecost is one of the seven principal feasts of the church year in the Episcopal Church (BCP, p. 15). The Day of Pentecost is identified by the BCP as one of the feasts that is “especially appropriate” for baptism (p. 312). The liturgical color for the feast is red. Pentecost has also been known by its traditional English name, Whitsun or Whitsunday, a corruption of “White Sunday.” This term reflects the custom by which those who were baptized at the Vigil of Pentecost would wear their white baptismal garments to church on the Day of Pentecost.
